Option 1: Transcription/Arrangement

Create a transcription/arrangement¹ of a short contrapuntal composition by J.S. Bach; e.g., you could transcribe a canon, chorale, minuet (or other baroque dance form), song, invention, sinfonia, fugue, etc. by J.S. Bach. Then analyze your work using the *On-Score Analysis* guidelines below.

Option 2: Composition

Compose an original contrapuntal passage in the style of J.S. Bach. Then analyze your work using the On-Score Analysis guidelines below.

Option 3:

Another type of counterpoint project (permission of instructor required).

On-Score Analysis

Analyze the work's *modulation scheme*. As appropriate for the type of work you have chosen, label the *main* sections of the work and identify *important motives*. For the beginning of the work (only), analyze the counterpoint in full detail. Discuss your analytical approach in your PDF reflection paper.

Grading

- This project is worth 15% of your MUSC 312 grade.
- Your grade will primarily be based on how well you followed the instructions above.
- Creativity, hard work, depth of composition/analytical ideas, length of paper, and passion for the project will
 also be factored in.

Upload your pdf score, mp3 file, pdf on-score analysis pdf, pdf reflection paper into the *Composition Project* Blackboard assignment by the deadline.

¹ According to <u>Britannica.com</u>, "A transcription is essentially the adaptation of a composition for an instrument or instruments other than those for which it was originally written. An arrangement is a similar procedure, although the arranger often feels free to take musical liberties with elements of the original score."

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Elements of Notation

- Use the free music notation program MuseScore to create your score, mp3 file, and on-score analysis.
- PDF scans of hand-written will also be accepted. If your work is hand written you do NOT need to submit an mp3 file.
- As applicable to your transcription/composition, be sure to use an appropriate key signature, time signature, instrumental/vocal ranges, etc.
- Your MuseScore notation should be legibly laid out on the page(s)
- Your composition *must* have a <u>tempo marking</u>.
- Your score *must* have <u>title</u>, <u>instrumentation</u>, <u>composer's name</u>, and <u>transcriber's name</u>, as appropriate for your project; e.g.,

Invention No. 13 in A minor

for banjo and marimba

J.S. Bach Transcribed by Béla Fleck

If you are using traditional manuscript paper

- Take great care in your *music calligraphy*. Be sure to correctly notate the clefs, key signature(s), time signature(s), noteheads, stems, beams, ledger lines, and so forth, as appropriate.²
- The <u>notes</u> should be <u>well-spaced within the bar</u> so that the music is easy for the performer to sight read.
- If there are <u>multiple parts</u> in your score, they *must* be <u>vertically aligned</u> so that the beats line up correctly.
- If you can't figure out how to notate something, consult a music notation reference source,³ check out a score from the Music Library that has a similar instrumentation, or ask me for help.
